I'm told by the construction crew that construction of a bathroom costs somewhat less than \$200,000. If you conservatively figure 6,000 residents in Plumas Lake, that equates to \$33/person. Spread out over 10 years, that's \$3/year additional cost for a bathroom. Seems hard to justify leaving out such a fundamental feature of a public park.
